We hope this kit will be helpful to you and that you will soon feel at home in Charlevoix. We wish you a warm welcome to your new community.



The Charlevoix Region

Charlevoix is a region in the Province of Québec located northeast of Québec City, along the shores of the St. Lawrence River. It boasts stunning natural landscapes, rich culture and local heritage, and a wide variety of tourism activities. The region was partially shaped by a meteorite impact. Charlevoix is made up of two regional county municipalities (MRCs), 13 municipalities, and 3 unorganized territories (TNOs). According to Statistics Canada (2021), it is home to 28,780 residents. The Charlevoix region offers diverse landscapes and weather throughout the seasons. It is a vibrant place to live, with much to offer: whale watching, outdoor activities, artists, local products, various sports, festivals, historical landmarks, and much more!


Important Steps to Take During Your First Days in Canada

In the First Few Days:

- Obtain a Social Insurance Number (SIN);
- Register with the Québec Health Insurance Board (RAMQ), and find out about waiting periods and the necessity of acquiring private health insurance;
- Purchase private health insurance if necessary;
- Open a bank account;
- Register to exchange your driver's license;
- Enroll your children in school and/or daycare.

After One Year:

- Learn about provincial and federal income taxes and file your tax return



Social Insurance Number (SIN)



A Social Insurance Number (SIN) is required in order to work legally in Canada. It will be essential from your very first days, as you'll need it to open a bank account and to begin a new job. This number is also used for filing income tax returns, employment insurance, family allowances, and many other government programs.

Obtaining a SIN is a free service. You simply need to go directly to a Service Canada office upon your arrival in Québec.

Health



Québec Health Insurance Board (RAMQ)

RAMQ is the agency responsible for managing Québec's public health insurance plan and prescription drug insurance plan.

Note: Eligibility for RAMQ depends on your immigration status.

Private Health Insurance

This type of insurance is intended for people who are not covered by RAMQ. If you are eligible for RAMQ, you will receive your health insurance card for free three months after registering. During this 3-month period, known as the RAMQ waiting period, you must be covered by private health insurance, even if you have group health insurance through your job. People aged 18 and over who are staying in Québec temporarily are generally not eligible for the public drug insurance plan, except in certain cases.




Family Doctor

A family doctor is a general practitioner assigned to you. You can book appointments with your family doctor as needed, which will make accessing healthcare much easier.

As soon as you receive your health insurance card, you should register on the waiting list to get a family doctor who is accepting new patients. Wait times to get a family doctor can vary. For information regarding pregnancies, please refer to page 33 (Section 10).




Medical Interpretation Services



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Transportation



Driver's License and Road Rules

Driver's License

You may drive a car for the first 6 months after arriving in Québec if you have a valid foreign driver's license. After this 6-month period, you must have a Québec driver's license. It is important to schedule an appointment with the Société de l'assurance automobile du Québec (SAAQ) as soon as you arrive to check whether you are eligible to exchange your foreign license for a Québec one.

Vehicle Registration

To be allowed to drive on Québec roads, every vehicle owner must register their vehicle with the SAAQ (Société de l'assurance automobile du Québec) and pay the required fees annually. For more information, visit the official website:

Important Note

Both vehicle registration and driver's license fees must be paid every year.

Child Car Seats

The law requires that your child be properly secured in a seat that is appropriate for their weight and height until they are able to safely use a seatbelt. Please note that all car seats have an expiration date. Be very cautious when purchasing a used car seat, make sure it has not expired and has never been involved in an accident.

Winter Driving

In winter, drivers must adapt their driving to weather and road conditions. To ensure everyone's safety, winter tires are mandatory from December 1 to March 15, inclusive.

However, in Charlevoix, especially in more mountainous areas, the first snowfalls often arrive well before December 1. It is therefore recommended to install your winter tires earlier to avoid being caught off guard.


To be compliant, a tire designed for winter driving must have the following symbol on it.

Tips to avoid Winter Surprises

Keep a winter emergency kit in your vehicle at all times. It should include: a snow brush, ice scraper, windshield washer fluid, shovel, etc.



Before hitting the road, **fully clear your vehicle of ice and snow**.

While driving, **reduce your speed** and keep a safe distance from the vehicle in front of you, especially when visibility is low or roads are slippery.

Even on sunny days, **beware of black ice**.

Always turn on your parking lights and low beam headlights when it's dark or cloudy.

If possible, **delay your trip** when road conditions are poor.

Have you thought about installing your winter tires?



In Charlevoix, snow often arrives before November.



Book an appointment with your nearest mechanic.



Make sure your tires are in good condition.



Winter tires are mandatory from December 1 to March 15.

Home Insurance



While not mandatory in Québec, it is strongly recommended to have home insurance or tenant's insurance if you are renting. It protects you in cases of theft, fire, water damage, or civil liability if you cause damage to others. Most insurance companies offer this type of coverage.

French Courses

In Charlevoix, Avice – Centre de formation Charlevoix (part of the Charlevoix School Service Centre) is the organization mandated by the Ministry of Immigration, Francisation and Integration (MIFI) to offer French language training. They provide part-time French courses in Baie-Saint-Paul and La Malbaie, adapted to each learner's level, regardless of prior knowledge of French. To be admitted, you must register on the official government platform (see the link on Francisation Québec's website). Avice also offers specialized training and French language learning activities in the workplace for newcomers.


FAC – Charlevoix Literacy and Learning Services

The Charlevoix Literacy and Learning Center (FAC) offers services to both francophone and non-francophone newcomers who need to improve their basic skills in reading, writing, math, and new technologies. FAC also provides community education workshops on a variety of topics. Finally, a support, referral, and guidance service is available for individuals who have difficulty filling out forms or understanding documents. This gives you access to various support services available in the region, such as nurses, doctors, and nutritionists.

Québec Parental Insurance Plan (RQAP)

Before your child is born, you can register for the Québec Parental Insurance Plan (QPIP/RQAP) to receive financial assistance during the weeks when you are unable to work due to the birth of your baby. This support can be used up until your child is 18 months old and can cover up to 75% of your salary. The program is flexible, adapts to your needs, and is available for mothers, fathers, or co-parents.

Family Allowances (Financial Support)

In Québec, two types of financial assistance may be provided to you from the birth of your child until they reach adulthood: the Family Allowance (from the Québec government) and the Canada Child Benefit (from the Canadian government). The amounts vary depending on family income.



Income Tax Filing

Each year, people living in Canada must file their income tax returns with both the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) (federal government) and Revenu Québec (provincial government). The deadline to submit your tax return is generally April 30. Here are some helpful tools:

Climate



The Charlevoix region is very popular during the summer season, as it is a highly sought-after tourist destination. You'll notice that the area gets significantly busier in the summer due to the influx of visitors!

Dressing for the Seasons

It is important to dress appropriately during the winter season, as temperatures can drop significantly.

The region offers many activities to help you get familiar with winter life. Here are the essential winter clothing items:

- 1 Winter Hat (Toque or Beanie)
- 2 Neck Warmer or Scarf
- 3 Winter Coat
- 4 Insulated Mittens or Gloves
- 5 Insulated Winter Pants
- 6 Winter Boots



Special Attention for Babies and Young Children

Because they move less, babies and young children are at higher risk of frostbite. It is especially important to dress them properly from head to toe with suitable winter gear. Once bundled up, they'll be able to enjoy the beautiful winter days right along with you!

Seasons and Weather

Charlevoix is a stunning region where each season brings unique landscapes and activities. Here's what you can experience throughout the year:

Spring

As the snow melts and the sun begins to warm the air, it's time to enjoy maple syrup, a sweet Québec specialty. Visit a sugar shack to learn how maple sap is transformed into syrup. You'll witness nature waking up, trees growing green leaves, and flowers blooming. It's like a rebirth of nature after the long winter months.



Summer

Long, warm days make it perfect for enjoying the outdoors. You can go cycling on Isle-aux-Coudres, an island in the middle of the St. Lawrence River, and admire the views. You can also watch whales near Baie-Sainte-Catherine or explore farmers' markets filled with fresh local products. Children have two months of school break, plenty of time to explore parks, patios, pools, and festivals that bring the region to life.



Fall (Autumn)

This is the season of colors, when the leaves turn brilliant shades of red, orange, and gold. It's the perfect time for hiking in national parks like Hautes-Gorges-de-la-Rivière-Malbaie or Grands-Jardins, where you can discover Charlevoix's unique wildlife and plants. Many sporting and cultural events are organized by local municipalities during this season.



Winter

When the cold sets in and the snow covers the ground, Charlevoix becomes a winter wonderland. You can go downhill or cross-country skiing at Le Massif de Charlevoix, known for its trails and breathtaking views of the river. You can also visit Mont Grand-Fonds or Les Sources Joyeuses to enjoy a variety of winter sports. Other popular activities include snowmobiling, dog sledding, ice skating, and snowshoeing. Winter can feel challenging, but it also has a lot to offer!



Important Note

We recommend subscribing to Environment Canada alerts to receive real-time notifications about severe weather events throughout the year (e.g., snowstorms, extreme cold, heatwaves, freezing rain, heavy rain, or severe thunderstorms).


Street Snow Removal

During the winter, snow removal operations take place regularly, which may lead to parking restrictions on city streets. Make sure to check your municipality's website for details specific to your area. Be careful, vehicles parked during snow removal may be towed!

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Waste and Recycling Sorting

In Charlevoix, waste is sorted into different bins based on the type of material:



Compost (Organic Waste)

Use the brown bin.



Recycling

Use the blue bin.



General Waste

Use the green bin.
